Anna Elizabeth Ramm (Gavlas) was born on June 4, 1928 in Melville. She was the youngest of four children born to John and Sophie (nee Stachura) Gavlas of the Brewer District.

Growing up in rural Saskatchewan, Anna loved life in the country. She did gardening and canning and helped to raise her beloved niece Eleanor and nephew Bob. She attended Fairland School, located a mile away on the edge of the family property, and later attended high school in Melville. During a family vacation in Florida, she met her future husband John. They corresponded, fell in love, and were married in June of 1948. The first ten years of their marriage, they lived in New York City during the winters and travelled extensively throughout the United States during the summers. They moved out of the big city to start raising their family and settled in different areas of upstate New York. They were blessed with three children: Susan, Bruce and John.

In 1973 Anna returned with her family to Melville to help care for her aging mother. In 1975, after a careful study of the Bible, Anna dedicated her life to Jehovah God, following in her mother's footsteps as one of Jehovah's Witnesses. It brought her great pleasure that her children also became worshippers of Jehovah.

Anna and John repaired the farm house that Anna had grown up in and moved to the farm in 1975. Anna enjoyed her return to rural life and loved raising her children and growing her large garden on the farm. Following her husband's death, Anna resided

in her home in Melville until she became a resident of St. Philomena Manor and finally, St. Paul Lutheran Home.

Anna remained an avid gardener all her life. She loved to watch her plants grow, both outside in the summer and indoors through the winter.
